Dear Franklin Academy,

As the President of the Board of Trustees, it is my honor and privilege to share with you The Franklin Academy's many accomplishments over this past year. We started the 2022-2023 academic year with an enrollment of 328 students, and for the second year in a row, we were voted the Best Private School in Whatcom County via Bellingham Alive magazine, earning a Gold Medal. After a year of preparation for a rigorous evaluation, The Franklin Academy was reaccredited by Cognia, an international organization that reviews over 40,000 institutions across 90 countries. Out of over 1,100 schools around the world that underwent reaccreditation reviews last year, The Franklin Academy stood out as one of 33 schools that earned Cognia's highest honor, a School of Distinction. In a separate process, The Franklin Academy also pursued Cognia's STEM Certification designation and was found to exceed all standards for program and instructional excellence. Achieving this coveted designation, The Franklin Academy is the only Cognia STEM Certified school in Whatcom County and one of only two schools in all of Washington State!

This year, The Franklin Academy celebrates its 50th Anniversary. It is remarkable to note that what began as a preschool in a church basement has grown into a premier internationally recognized academic institution. This is a direct result of the synergistic interaction between an engaged Board of Trustees, outstanding academic leadership and classroom instruction, and financial support. I'm grateful for our deeply committed volunteer Board of Trustees that provides the vision for the school and help navigate an ever-evolving academic landscape. Our Head of School Gretchen Bucsko, Associate Head of School Melanie Hurley, Lower School Director Chris Lyzwinski, and the top-notch teachers and staff of The Franklin Academy are the actual "boots on the ground" that are tasked with accomplishing the mission. Without sacrificing high standards, they infuse the process of educating our children and building character with fun and kindness.

The vision and mission of our school cannot materialize without financial resources. In contrast to our public and parochial counterparts, The Franklin Academy is an independent and private school. While this enables us to control our curriculum and educational product, it also means that we do not receive financial support from taxpayers or religious affiliations. The Franklin Academy today would not have been possible without the generous financial support of the families and friends of the school. STANDARDIZED ASSESSMENTS - ERB

As you read the results, we would like you to understand the big picture of the assessments. Standardized assessments are one tool in a wide variety of tools that teachers, administrators and parents can use to assess how a student is performing and mastering learning. Standardized assessments are used at a school level to help direct funding and curriculum. They provide a snapshot of how your child performed during testing and are not necessarily indicators of classroom performance.

ERB Big Picture

Classroom performance should be the primary measure of your child's skills and knowledge. On a larger scale, these assessments help administrators develop professional development and facilitate school wide decisions. Parents can use these assessments as one piece of evidence; however, please use caution to make any large determinations based on the results.

The Franklin Academy participates in standardized testing for several important reasons.

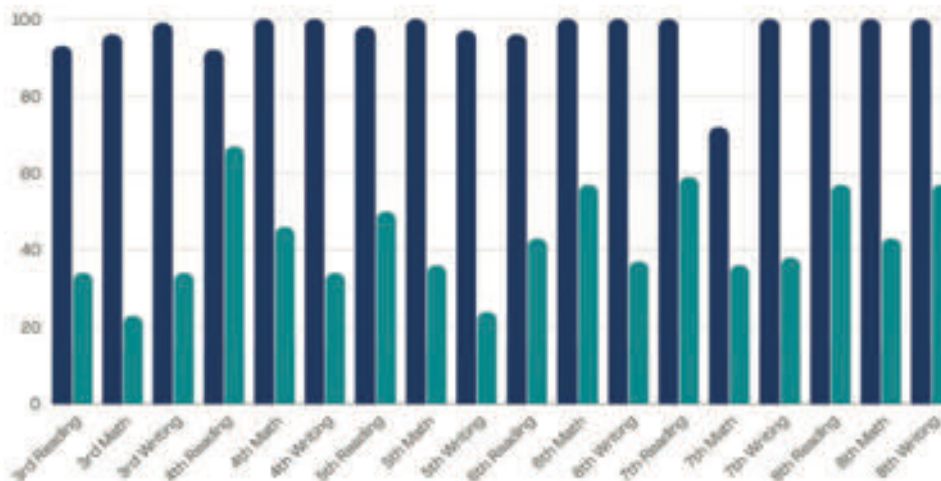
- Standardized testing is our only external and objective measure of our program and our success.
- While anecdotal reports of the achievements of our graduates are certainly valid data, these measures are not easily quantifiable or comparable.
- It can be very useful to teachers to gain a sense of the progress of individual students and for administrators to understand the progress of each class.

TEST RESULTS

As seen in the chart The Franklin Academy students are consistently above the national norm. The demonstrated academic achievement and mastery attest to and validate the tangible benefits of the intensity and focus of our academic programs, our small class sizes, inspired teaching and commitment to individual excellence. At The Franklin Academy, our teachers know their students; particularly their academic and personal strengths and challenges. Grades and assessments are a natural outcome of these working relationships. On the other hand, it is also appropriate to measure our program and each student's progress against external objective measures. ERB stands for Educational Records Bureau. This non-profit organization has been in existence for almost 90 years and has member schools around the world. It is a test that most Independent Schools use throughout the world.

The Franklin Academy creates a comfortable, safe, inclusive learning space that allows children to explore, imagine, and immerse themselves in socialization and high-end academics. Our family decided to make the move to The Franklin Academy in 2020 due in part to the pandemic, but also seeking a more structured educational experience than what was being provided in the public school system.

Immediately our three kids were welcomed by the other students, teachers, and staff into an atmosphere of support. We had never truly appreciated the importance of class size, but I can tell you now that it makes a huge difference! The small class sizes provide our kids with abundant one-on-one time with their teachers, which is a huge catalyst for learning and mastering subjects.

In our opinion, TFA shines at assessing each student's abilities, meeting them where they are in terms of ability, and then working with them to take their education to a new level. What was first a short-term solution, has turned into a long-term commitment to the school and the community.

ADMISSIONS

The Franklin Academy (TFA) is the only STEM-accredited preschool to middle school in Whatcom County. Our academy is highly regarded for its academic focus, made possible by the small class sizes, dedicated faculty, and active parental involvement. TFA is a close-knit and supportive community. Students benefit from hands-on learning through meaningful and creative projects, while balancing core subjects and project-based learning.

Our preschool to 8th grade program has enrolled 328 students, with word-of-mouth referrals being our primary means of promotion. Prospective families are often connected with current TFA families to learn more about our school. Therefore, retaining our current families is crucial to our recruitment process. We received so much interest in the 2022-23 school year that we opened three sections for both 1st and 3rd grade.

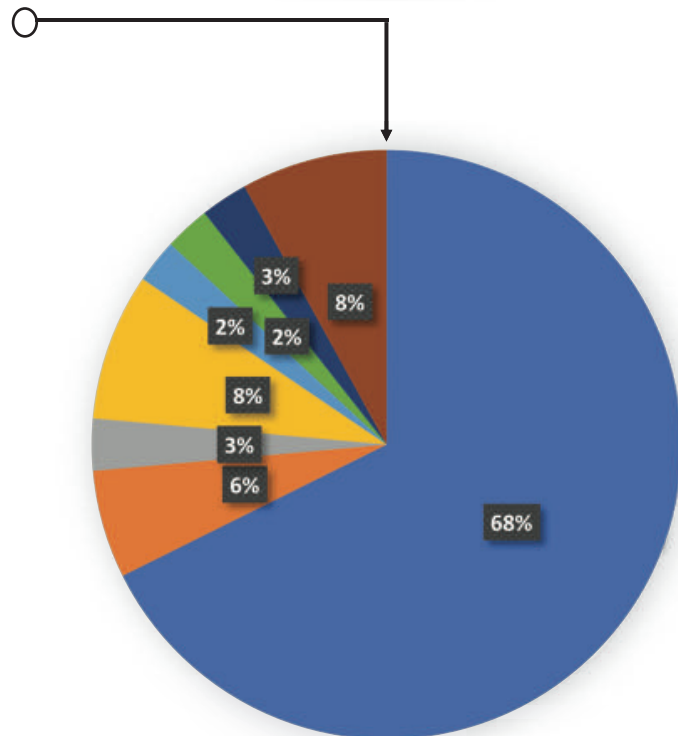
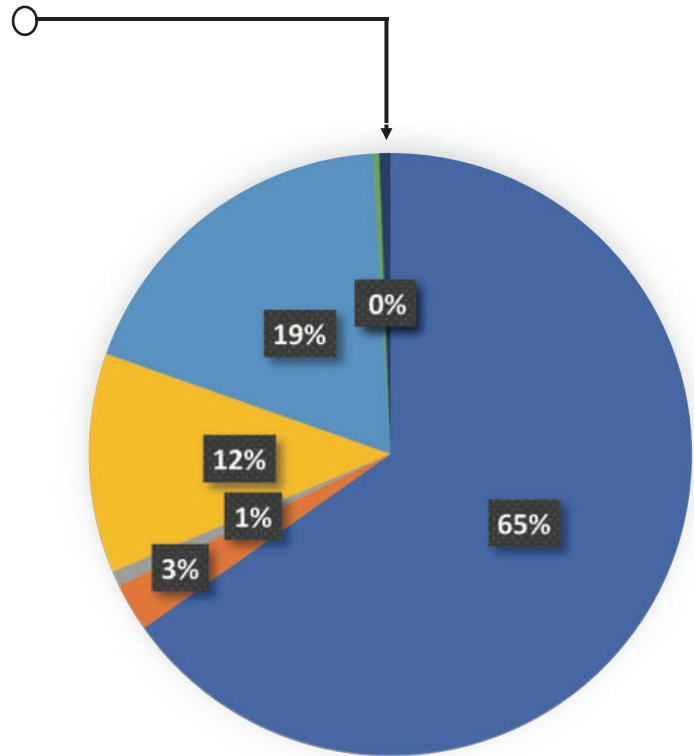

If philanthropy is an outward expression of the love of humanity, then fundraising at The Franklin Academy chronicles the love of parents, grandparents, teachers, and community members dedicated to the school's mission, needs, and priorities.

You, our donors, are active participants. You give both your time and treasure. You imagine a world where more students have access to a top rate education. Additionally, an astounding seventy-nine donors raised the paddle for tuition assistance, providing over \$100,000 to students needing extra support.

Please accept our gratitude for your financial gifts that allow us to expand our STEM programs, hire and retain outstanding teachers and staff, provide financial assistance to students, and maintain our mission.

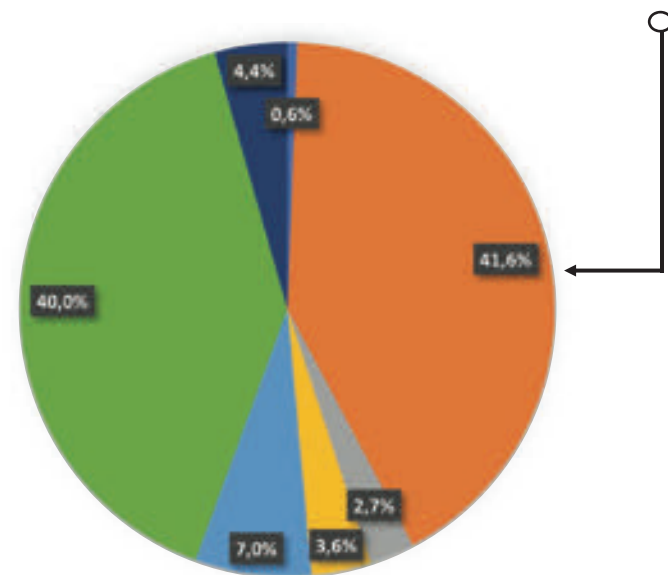
